
Warm greetings to all of you who are considering becoming students at The Young Americans College of the Performing Arts.


EDUCATIONAL OBJECTIVES

Artistry - Students will develop their artistic voice and gain an acute awareness, understanding, appreciation and expression of the performing arts.

Leadership - Students will develop and demonstrate application of ethical decision making, defined values system, diversity of knowledge and understanding of management and team leadership.

Global Perspective - Students will develop skills that allow them to effectively and professionally work across cultural boundaries.

Life-Long Learning - Students will develop critical analysis skills and be able to apply these skills to a life-long pursuit of knowledge.



LIFE OF A YOUNG AMERICAN

The extraordinary young people who are students at The Young Americans College of the Performing Arts are not always beautiful or handsome in the way glamour magazines show. They represent all colors and many religions of the world. They come from wealthy homes and poor homes, from big cities and small towns, two-parent homes and one-parent homes. The common qualities that each of them share is a passion for the performing arts, caring for others and a desire for personal and artistic growth.

Those who are chosen to participate in The Young Americans program leave their families and friends in places like Nebraska, New York, Alabama, Tokyo, Hamburg and London to travel to Southern California to begin a life of extraordinary hard work and sacrifice — a life that will include not only training in theater, music and dance, but laughter, tears, travel, understanding, wisdom, and lifelong friendships. The Young Americans College of the Performing Arts program encompasses intensive study in vocal performance, dance, acting, music theory, and music history. In addition, the program recognizes the need for the student to study the basics of human psychology, personal finance, and more to develop life skills so they may become not simply a successful performer, but a performer who is successful in all aspects of their life.

The program of study is very intensive. The average YA student spends 45 hours each week in their freshman year engaged in lectures, classes, workshops and rehearsals. In the second year, the student is exposed to a variety of performance opportunities and is encouraged to refine the skills needed in the entertainment and education world. By the end of their time with the program, the average student has had the opportunity to participate in studio recitals, live concert performances, and 10-week domestic and/or international touring productions. The graduating student has a strong skill set that will help them become successful as a performer, educator or whatever they choose for their life's work.



LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES WITH THE YOUNG AMERICANS

The Young Americans College of the Performing Arts offers each student a unique learning experience. The emphasis is upon training performers and arts educators, however, these components also contain fundamental lessons that can be applied to any career path the student may choose.

MUSIC OUTREACH TOUR TRAINING PROGRAM

The Young Americans College of the Performing Arts runs a training program designed to prepare new members of The Young Americans for participation as a performer and teacher with The Young Americans' International Music Outreach Tour. The training program is completed in the student's first year and works on developing performance techniques, teaching techniques and artistic growth. New members of The Young Americans must complete this program prior to auditioning for a place on a Music Outreach Tour.

ASSOCIATE OF ARTS IN PERFORMANCE DEGREE PROGRAM

The Associate of Arts in Performance degree program is a two-year program of study that emphasizes the development of artistic growth coupled with the development of leadership, cultural literacy and a commitment to continued personal growth. The Associate of Arts in Performance degree is musically oriented and develops a foundation of contemporary performance skills in the genres of voice, acting, and dance. The overall degree provides students with technical proficiency, live performance experiences, and core academic classes so they may become well rounded artists.

PERFORMANCE OPPORTUNITIES

The integration between the College degree and the productions of The Young Americans organization provides students the opportunity to continue to work towards completing their education with The Young Americans College of the Performing Arts while participating in domestic and international tours (pending invitation from artistic director), dinner theatres, album recordings and large venue live concert performances.

NORTH CENTRAL MICHIGAN COLLEGE AFFILIATION (NCMC)

The NCMC partnership gives YA students the choice to be concurrently enrolled at NCMC, a fully accredited college. This provides significant benefits to students including credit transferability and access to financial aid. Students will not duplicate courses; courses will be taught in our California classrooms or completed online. See page 5 for details.





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BENEFITS

- In the course of two years students can earn up to 48 credits of YA course work taken through NCMC. These credits will appear on a NCMC transcript and be eligible for transfer to other educational institutions.
- Access to federal financial aid (grants and student loans) as a full-time NCMC student. Financial aid is available to qualified students enrolled in 6 or more North Central credit hours.
- By taking an additional 12 credits of General Education courses directly through NCMC, students may earn an Associate Degree in General Studies. These credits can be taken online at any time or in person after leaving the YA program.

ASSOCIATE DEGREE IN GENERAL STUDIES

The AGS is the most flexible degree option through NCMC and is earned by many students who wish to transfer to a college or university to complete a Bachelor's Degree. To earn an AGS, a minimum of 60 college-level credits is required. In addition to the 48 credits you'll earn while participating in the Young Americans' Associate Degree in Performance program of study, an additional 12 credits must be taken directly through NCMC or another accredited college or university at any time before, during, or after your time with The Young Americans. Many courses are offered online throughout the fall, winter and summer NCMC sessions. Potential elective courses include: Art History, Intro to Marketing, Basic Photography, Intro to American Government, Principles of Management, and Children's Literature. (Pre-requisites may be required.)

REQUIREMENTS

The following requirements are necessary to participate in the NCMC affiliation:

- 1. ACT (min. score Reading 21, English 18) or SAT (min. score Reading 450, Writing/English 430)
- 2. U.S. Citizenship (dual citizenship is acceptable TOEFL required [min. score Paper 550, Computer-based 213, Internet-based 79])
- 3. Completion of NCMC enrollment steps and acceptance into NCMC.







OUR CAMPUS

The Young Americans main campus is located in Corona, CA. The current location houses administrative offices, large rehearsal halls, multiple classrooms, computer & keyboard lab, student lounge, music library, private practice rooms, and set and wardrobe storage. Associate of Arts

The Young Americans College of the Performing Arts offers an Associate of Arts in Performance. This program of study can be completed in two years, although many students choose to continue touring and performing with The Young Americans upon completion of the program.

PROGRAM PURPOSE

To develop the student's artistry, leadership, cultural literacy, and continued personal growth so they may become well-rounded artists.

Program of Study

Students who complete the 60 unit program of study will earn an AA in Performance. Students may elect to take one or more of the genre emphases to earn the following:

Formatted as a live performance in which students perform both solo and ensemble works in a range of genres. The capstone experience is coordinated through the Advanced Performance and Musical Theatre course instructors.

VOICE & MUSIC

MU 101/102 - Chorale I/ Chorale II

1 unit, Lab | Contact Hours: 30

A large size vocal organization that performs a comprehensive selection of music styles in concert. Chorale may be repeated for up to 4 credits and is open by audition to any student in the College.

MU 111 - Semi-Private Voice

1 unit, Studio | Contact Hours: 20

This course is designed to offer students the opportunity to study the process of vocal production in a semi-private setting. Emphasis is upon developing vocal techniques and stylistic choices for the individual voice while simultaneously learning from the instructor and by observing student peers. Students meet weekly in groups of 5 students maximum in addition to a weekly peer performance setting.

MU 112 - Private Vocal Instruction

1 unit, Studio | Contact Hours: 20

A course providing private vocal lessons, with permission from each instructor, contingent upon approval by the Music Coordinator. Private Vocal Instruction may be repeated for up to 3 credits.

MU 120 - History of Music

3 units, Lecture | Contact Hours: 45

This course is an overview of musical styles, historical periods, and technical elements designed to expand a student's musical intellect. *Pre-requisite: MU 131*

General Education Distribution Area: Humanities

MU 121 - Piano I

1 unit, Lab | Contact Hours: 30

This course is designed to give students a comprehensive introduction to keyboard musicianship and proficiency. Students will learn the fundamental skills of identifying notes, learning major and minor scales, and playing chords. Students will also learn how to read notated sheet music and play from lead-sheets. Placement test required prior to enrollment in this course.

MU 128 - Vocal Techniques I

1 unit, Lecture | Contact Hours: 15

Gives singers the knowledge and skills to become self-sufficient singers and educators. Topics covered include vocal health, vocal anatomy and pedagogy, as well as the basics of proper diction. Singers will learn about auditioning, microphone technique, improvisation, and song interpretation. Ensemble work and conducting as it pertains to singers will be covered, as well as the basics of instructing others to improve their voice.

MU 129 - Vocal Techniques II

1 unit, Lecture | Contact Hours: 15

This course builds upon Vocal Techniques I and introduces pedagogy and the basics of conducting singers. Duet and small ensemble vocal techniques are also covered.

Pre-requisite: MU 128

MU 130 - Music Theory I

3 units, Lecture | Contact Hours: 45

A class of integrated fundamentals of basic musicianship. Training is given in aspects of all melodic and harmonic intervals and rhythms.

Placement test required prior to enrollment in this course.

MU 131 - Music Theory II

3 units, Lecture | Contact Hours: 45

A continuation of Music Theory I. Includes the importance of comprehending musical notation and the advantages of sight-reading over memory retention and rote learning.

Pre-requisite: MU 130

MU 205 - Vocal Techniques III

1 unit, Lecture | Contact Hours: 15

This course builds upon the concepts of Vocal Techniques II and further equips singers for work in the professional world. Students will learn more about different styles of singing, and will learn how to teach others to improve their voice. Other topics include marketing and networking as a singer. *Pre-requisite: MU 128*

MU 221 - Piano II

1 unit, Lab | Contact Hours: 30

This course expands on the concepts taught in Piano I. Students will continue to practice the fundamentals of piano playing and study the application of music theory to the piano. Students will strengthen their sight reading ability by playing notated sheet music. Students will also continue to develop the skill of keyboard harmonization through the study of lead-sheet arranging. *Prerequisite: MU 121 or instructor approval.*

MU 275 - Song Writing

1 unit, Lecture | Contact Hours: 15

This course is an examination and analysis of the methods and structure of song writing with a focus on developing song writing skills and enhancing scope of music appreciation. *Placement test required prior to enrollment in this course.*

MU 290 - Performance Teaching Practicum

2 units, Practicum | Activity Hours: 70

This course covers teaching techniques studied in real world situations. Emphasis will be upon preparation techniques and self-review of effectiveness in communicating with students. Students will be expected to undergo a self study to identify their own strengths and weaknesses and begin to understand how their own strengths and weaknesses impact the learning experience for the young students they are working with. Pre-Requisites – EDU 150 and EDU 151. Artistic Director Invitation required for practicum application in conjunction with Young Americans Music Outreach Tours.

DANCE

DAN 120 - Classical Ballet I

1 unit, Lab | Contact Hours: 30

This course studies the most traditional and disciplined form of dance at the beginner level. Emphasis is placed upon strength, conditioning, technique development, and vocabulary. *Placement test required prior to enrollment in this course.*

DAN 121 - Jazz Dance I

1 unit, Lab | Contact Hours: 30

This course develops the intermediate dancer's style and form through the various styles of jazz dance. Emphasis is placed upon stamina and coordination of movements. *Placement test required prior to enrollment in this course.*

General Education Distribution Area: Physical Conditioning



DAN 122 - Modern Movement I

1 unit, Lab | Contact Hours: 30

This course explores a variety of dance styles and genres popular in today's performance world. Areas may include lyrical, hip hop, ballroom, salsa, and African. History of the evolution of each genre is also included.

DAN 123 - Tap Dance

1 unit, Lab | Contact Hours: 30

This course develops the beginner to intermediate tap dancers skills. Emphasis is placed upon rhythm creation and technique. Placement test required prior to enrollment in this course.

DAN 220 - Classical Ballet II

1 unit, Lab | Contact Hours: 30

This course studies the most traditional and disciplined form of dance at the intermediate level. Emphasis is placed upon strength, conditioning, technique development and vocabulary. *Pre-requisite: DAN 120 or instructor approval.*

DAN 221 - Jazz Dance II

1 unit, Lab | Contact Hours: 30

This course develops the advanced dancer's style and form through the various styles of jazz dance. Emphasis is placed upon technique and dance interpretation. *Pre-requisite: DAN 121 or instructor approval.*

General Education Distribution Area: Physical Conditioning

DAN 222 - Modern Movement II

1 unit, Lab | Contact Hours: 30

This course expands upon Modern Movement I with an emphasis upon performance-based application of genre-specific techniques. *Pre-requisite: DAN 122 or instructor approval.*

DAN 250 - Classical Ballet III

1 unit, Lab | Contact Hours: 30

This course studies the most traditional and disciplined form of dance at the advanced level. Emphasis is placed upon performance application of techniques. *Pre-requisite: DAN 220 or instructor approval.*

DAN 251 - Jazz Dance III

1 unit, Lab | Contact Hours: 30

This course develops the professional dancer's style and form through the various styles of jazz dance. Emphasis is placed upon performance application of techniques. *Pre-requisite: DAN 221 or instructor approval.*

DAN 260 - Choreography

1 unit, Lab | Contact Hours: 30

This course develops the choreographer's creative process for solo dances. Emphasis will be placed on identifying, selecting and utilizing a variety of source material through use of critical evaluation skills for dance, use of choreographic devices, use of improvisation for generating movement, creating meaning through the use of time, space, energy/force, and weight, and creation of a written personal artistic statement. *Instructor approval required prior to enrollment in this course.*

THEATRE

THF 100 - Intro to Acting

1 unit, Lab | Contact hours: 30

This course is an introduction to the basic tools of acting. We will explore various acting techniques, history and theories of acting, script and role analysis, physical and vocal skills, and characterization. Students will engage in improvisation, vocal and physical exercises, relaxation and concentration. Monologues and scenes from modern plays will be performed in class for analysis and evaluation. The student should be able to apply the tools in his or her own unique and honest interpretation.

THF 101 - Survey of Theatre

3 units, Lecture | Contact Hours: 45

Survey and appreciation of the different areas of the theater. Major topics include performance, terminology, acting, improvisation, directing, literature of the theater, and set design, as well as individual and group projects.

General Education Distribution Area: Humanities

THF 102 - Acting

3 units, Lecture | Contact Hours: 45

An exploration to various acting techniques, theories of acting, script and role analysis, characterization, stage make-up, and physical and vocal skills. Students engage in improvisation, pantomime, vocal and physical exercises, relaxation and concentration. Scenes from modern plays are performed in class for analysis and evaluation. *Pre-requisites: THF 110*

THF 110 - Scene & Character Development

1 unit, Lab | Contact Hours: 30

This course builds upon Intro to Acting. The student continues scene work in modern American drama. Emphasis will be on scene analysis including character development and interpretation as well as creating a sense of truthfulness, humanity, and relatability. *Pre-requisite: THF 100*

THF 115 - Improvisation

1 unit, Lab | Contact hours: 30

The course will explore how the tool of improvisation has been, and even more presently, is being used in the creative process within the performing arts community.

THF 150 - Intro to Stagecraft

1 unit, Lecture | Contact Hours: 15

This course will outline the areas of stagecraft through demonstration, application, and examination of the creative physical elements of a production; including production management, lighting, sound, set development and costume design.

THF 201 - Performance Practicum

2 units, Practicum | Activity Hours: 70

This course offers the student an opportunity to apply their performance skills in a comprehensive practicum experience that involves repeat performances of the same production. The emphasis is upon allowing the student to refine their performance techniques based upon varying performance venues, audiences, and learning how to produce a quality performance night after night.

Pre-requisites: THF 110, MU 131, DAN 121, MU 112. Artistic Director Invitation required for practicum application in conjunction with Young Americans Music Outreach Tours.



THF 210 - Musical Theatre

2 units, Lecture | Contact Hours: 30

This course covers the practical application of acting, singing, and movement techniques to various styles of period and contemporary musical theatre works. The student will prepare and rehearse vignettes from musical theatre productions. *Pre-requisite: THF 110*

THF 230 - Audition Techniques

1 unit, Lab | Contact Hours: 30

This course teaches the acting student how best to present him/her self in seeking a job as an actor. There will be an emphasis on cold reading technique and how to break down a script. Includes repertoire development, audition etiquette, how to dress, attitude and posture, developing a portfolio, emphasizing a natural approach to meeting people, and presenting the strongest and best attributes in each person. There is an emphasis on understanding and accepting one's essence and using that information to better market oneself as an actor. Placement test required prior to enrollment in this course. Concurrent enrollment in THF 102 required.

THF 275 - Stagecraft Crew

2 units, Practicum | Activity Hours: 60

In this course the student will apply the skills learned in THF 150 through the fulfillment of a crew position in a major production or touring company. Student has the option to pick a crew specialty – costumes, props, lighting, sound or sets.

Pre-requisite: THF 150. Artistic Director Invitation required for practicum application in conjunction with Young Americans Music Outreach Tours.

THF 299 - Advanced Performance

1 unit, Lab | Contact Hours: 30

This course works to produce a performance composed of original works which combine acting, singing and dance elements. Emphasis is upon assisting the individual student explore their own sense of artistry.

BREADTH OF KNOWLEDGE

B 104 - Business Math

3 units, Hybrid | Contact Hours: 22.5 + 22.5 online
Uses fundamental tools of basic arithmetic to solve every
day business problems. Topics include fractions, decimals,
percentages, banking records, payroll, insurance, interest (simple
and compound), promissory notes, installment loans, consumer
credit.

General Education Distribution Area: Quantitative Reasoning

BIO 133 - Human Biology with Lab

4 units, Online or Hybrid | Contact Hours: 60 A lab science course that covers selected structures and functions with application to current health issues. The lab emphasis is the identification of both gross and microscopic anatomy.

General Education Distribution Area: Science

COM 170 - Interpersonal Communication

3 units, Online | Contact Hours: 45

This course is designed to explore and develop an individual's communication skills within the contact of interpersonal relationships, small groups and society as a whole. Over the course of a semester, a variety of educational approaches may be used including writing, speaking, collaborative and independent learning, role playing, independent research, and written reports.

General Education Distribution Area: Communication

ED 150 - Teaching Methods: By Age & Development

4 units, Lecture & Lab | Contact Hours: 60

Teaching Methods is a foundational lecture course, preparing students for work both as a Young American and as a professional educator. The course is designed to provide candidates with an opportunity to study, reflect, question, become knowledgeable about, and develop skills in instructional methods while applying and practicing these skills in a collaborative and constructive setting. Emphasized content includes teaching methodologies, the eight modes of learning, Bloom's Taxonomy, classroom management techniques, child development, educational philosophy, and multiculturalism. This course introduces the student to teaching in a practical setting. Students participate in teaching settings involving elementary to high school ages. Emphasis is upon applying teaching methods in a performance-based environment.

General Education Distribution Area: Social Science

ENG 111 - English Composition I

3 units, Hybrid | Contact Hours: 22.5 + 22.5 online
This course emphasizes language skills, particularly essay writing,
but also reading, speaking and listening. Reading and writing
are explored in the general categories of description, narration,
exposition, argumentation, and writing on demand. Students
enrolling in ENG 111 should have a basic mastery of fundamental
writing skills. Successful completion of the course is dependent
upon a final portfolio assessment that will be anonymously
evaluated by English department faculty.

ENG 112 - English Composition II

3 units, Hybrid | Contact Hours: 22.5 + 22.5 online Strengthens and develops writing skills covered in ENG 111, emphasizing research techniques and the necessity of logical support, structure, style, and documentation. Students are encouraged to consider their professional and academic goals as they conduct their research. *Pre-Requisites – ENG 111* General Education Distribution Area: English

PSY 161 - Introduction to Psychology

3 units, Lecture | Contact Hours: 45

This course will introduce students to the scientific study of thought, behavior, and emotion in humans and animals. Emphasis will be placed on (but not limited to) the study of personality, learning, memory, intelligence, gender and sexuality, social interaction, group processes, motivation, emotion, and sociocultural factors in both a current and historical perspective. Basic concepts and principles of psychology will be examined with a comprehensive focus on research methodology and the biological basis of behavior.

General Education Distribution Area: Social Science

SOC 171: Introduction to Sociology

3 units, Lecture | Contact Hours: 45

This course is an introduction to the scientific study of society, examining modern western societies in terms of social processes, organizations, institutions, and problems. Topics covered include: the sociological perspective, socialization and culture, social networks, group dynamics, social deviance, social stratification, sex and gender inequality, race and age inequality, and collective behavior.

Enrollment Options

In order to support an intensive and creative learning environment that is both of high quality and adaptable to student needs, a student can enroll in The Young Americans College program in any of the following manners:



Associate of Arts in Performance Track

This option is for those students wishing to receive a tuition discount available by paying their tuition on an annual or semester basis and committing to completing the Associate of Arts Degree in Performance in accordance to suggested course sequencing, pending invitation to participate in touring company in the sophomore year.



Associate of Arts in Performance Track with NCMC Credit

This option is for those students wishing to participate in the North Central Michigan College affiliation and receive a tuition discount available by paying their YA tuition on an annual or semester basis and their NCMC tuition on a semester basis; committing to completing the Associate of Arts Degree in Performance in accordance to suggested course sequencing, pending invitation to participate in touring company in the sophomore year, and working towards earning the Associate Degree in General Studies from NCMC.



Music Outreach Training Certificate Track

This option is for new members of The Young Americans who wish to be eligible for participation in Music Outreach Tours, but do NOT wish to earn the AA from YA or the AGS through NCMC.

All options allow the student to complete the Music Outreach Training Certificate as required to be eligible for participation in YA Music Outreach Tours at the end of their freshman year.



The Young Americans Board of Directors has approved a number of partial tuition scholarships (average scholarship approx. \$1,000 per semester). Scholarships are available and awarded based upon a criteria mix including audition presentation, program of study, financial need, growth potential, and personal letters of recommendation.

Application instructions will be shared directly with applying students. Applications are due May 1st each year. Awards are typically announced in late May.

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is available to students participating in the NCMC affiliation. This includes Federal Pell Grants, Student Loans and Parent Loans. Application instructions will be shared directly with applying students.

Tuition amounts are based on the Enrollment Classification chosen by the student. Tuition payment options follow below:



<u>OPTION A-1</u> - Associate of Arts in Performance Track - Annual Tuition Rate

Tuition is paid in full at the beginning of each academic year - **\$6,900 per year for 2 years**



<u>OPTION A-2</u> - Associate of Arts in Performance Track - Semester Tuition Rate

Tuition is paid in full at the beginning of each academic semester - \$3,642.50 per semester for 2 years (4 semesters)



OPTION B-1 - Associate of Arts in Performance Track with NCMC Credit - Annual Tuition Rate

Tuition for YA is paid in full at the beginning of each academic year - \$5,240 per year for 2 years to YA Tuition for NCMC is paid in full at the beginning of each academic semester - \$3,000 (estimated) per semester to NCMC (4 semesters)

Total estimated annual cost - \$11,240



OPTION B-2 - Associate of Arts in Performance Track with NCMC Credit -Semester Tuition Rate

Tuition for YA is paid in full at the beginning of each academic semester - \$2,815 per semester for 2 years to YA (4 semesters)

Tuition for NCMC is paid in full at the beginning of each academic semester - \$3,000 (estimated) per semester to NCMC (4 semesters)

Total estimated semester cost - \$5,815





Student Housing

The Young Americans College of the Performing Arts has made special arrangements with an apartment complex located a short walk from our campus. These apartment facilities are gated and provide a clean, comfortable living environment.

Each apartment will have two bedrooms with closets, two full bathrooms and will come furnished with one refrigerator, one twin bed (regular) per student, dishwasher, stove, microwave, in-unit washer and dryer, Internet/WiFi connection, and access to a pool, hot tub and fitness center.

The initial rental contract with The Young Americans will be for the freshman year. The lease term will commence late July and end late April. Students are required to have a cosigner regardless of age. Shorter lease terms are available during the sophomore year.

If the student needs to break this lease for any reason, they will be responsible for finding another eligible Young American to take their place, who will then sign a separate replacement lease with The Young Americans.
